HOME ALONE—Separation Anxiety



(From All Creatures)

If your dog suffers from separation anxiety when left alone here are some tips that might help:

- 1. Make your departure and return times calm. Try to leave without fanfare and return in the same way. Consider saying the same phrase such as "be right back" every time you leave.
- 2. Create a safe, low stress environment. If your dog is not comfortable in a crate maybe try a safe room with a baby gate instead, removing anything that might be ingested or destroyed. Leave him with something to do...toys, puzzle feeders, Kong-maybe something special that he only gets when you leave him.
- 3. Limit time left alone. Try to limit the length of time that he'll be by himself. Maybe ask a neighbor to let him out or consider doggy day care.
- 4. Try progressive desensitization by trying separation at home for just a few minutes at a time until he gets used to your being gone. Or in some cases antianxiety medications may be necessary—this would be a last resort of course and you should consult with your vet .

Your pet doesn't have to struggle each time you leave. He just needs to feel safe and when you come home to a calm pet you'll both feel better

Did you know that some brands of premium dog food can actually cost less than so-called economy brand? The reason is that the higher priced dog food is so densely packed with nutrients you can feed your dog less of it.

Changes always changing

We have made some changes and increased responsibilities for our

mentors. As you know, we normally had a requirement for a hands on assessment for any canine volunteer who was 8 years old or over. After much discussion and investigation, we have discontinued that and now are asking our mentors to be more diligent in assessing the aging of our volunteers. As we have discovered, owners know their dogs and most owners will retire their dog voluntarily when they see that the dog is aging and no longer a willing and loving volunteer and our mentors can help in this assessment. So we thank the mentors for taking this on and I know it will go well.

Our expert evaluator, Nanci Caron, has drafted complete guidelines for our mentors to follow in this evaluation and we think this will be a more appropriate method to follow through on our aging pets.

Give Guide

Once again, Paws for Healing has been selected to participate in Napa's CanDo's *Give!Guide* project. This is the seventh year of this event which supports Napa County nonprofits by raising funds and awareness, fostering collaboration, and cultivating an ever-larger community of givers. Over 100 nonprofits have been beneficiaries. Nonprofits go through an application and vetting process in the spring and must reapply each year.

Donations are made via the website or by check and begin at just \$10 with incentive prizes and thank you gifts for donors. The donations are accepted between November 1 and December 31.

Paws for Healing is excited to be a participant in this project again and hope that we can inspire our friends to donate to our organization! We always need money for advertising to encourage new volunteers and money for our

Mentor Meeting

As I mentioned earlier our mentoring has changed a bit with more responsibility placed on our mentor volunteers. After much discussion, investigation, and referrals we have decided not to continue the hands-on-required-evaluation for our canines who are 8 years old and over.

Instead we are asking the pet owners and the mentors to take a stronger role in assuring that the dogs are aging well and are still appropriate for volunteering.

We are having a mentor meeting on <u>January 11</u>, <u>2020 at 10 AM in Napa</u>. If you are serving as a mentor we ask you to try to come to this meeting—lunch will be provided. It is an opportunity to clarify this new process and to answer any questions. One of our registered evaluators, Nanci Caron, will be there to answer questions and lead the discussion. Your dog loves you

This might seem like an obvious statement, but from a recent article by Jonah Goldberg—who is a fellow at the American Enterprise Institute and a senior editor of National Review—he said that studies have shown that dogs aren't faking it when they act like they love you because it is not an act!

He was reporting on a study done by Dr Gregory Berns, a neuroscientist at Emory University who spent all day taking magnetic resonance imaging pictures of dog brains. They did a host of tests that looked at different centers of the doggie brain and how they responded to different stimuli. In one test, they alternated between giving the pooches hot dogs and offering them praise. Looking at the pleasure centers of the dog's brains, the researcher found that nearly all the dogs responded to "Who's a good boy?! You are!" with as much pleasure as when they got a bit of hot dog. A fifth of the dogs actually preferred praise to food. The conclusion was that dogs derive as much pleasure from love as from food.

In addition, they found evidence that dogs evolved an ability found almost nowhere else in the animal world: to read human body language and expressions.

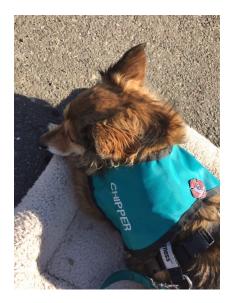
Anyone who has come home to their dog after an extended absence will tell you, dogs don't go bonkers for missing loved ones solely because they think there's meal in it for them. Some say it is just a big con game, but Goldberg thinks that is just a dumb conclusion.

He ended the article by saying "Dog genes may be designed to con us, but the dogs themselves aren't in on the caper. They just love us, because that's what dogs do."

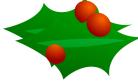
