TRUDEE AND TRISTAN--WHAT A PAIR!

Trudee Lewis and her adorable Bichon, Tristan, are retiring from Paws for Healing this fall. Trudee and Tristan have been an incredible volunteer team for nine years and it is with much sadness that we say farewell to them. She said that Tristan was such a hyperactive dog that she needed to wait until he was five years old and kind of "mellowed out" before she could get him to



settle down

In addition to that, Trudee has helped out PFH numerous times and in many ways, always saying "yes" when extra volunteers were needed--for training

sessions, for events, for any PFHsponsored activity.

And if that was not enough,
Trudee has



donated more than \$1000 to Paws for Healing through the sale of her series of books written about Tristan. She wrote six books (for sale at Amazon--six books in English, and six in Spanish) telling the story of Tristan--at the vet, at Paws for Healing training, as a therapy dog, and at the groomer--all beautifully photographed and written to help educate people on dogs and the value they bring to our lives. Trudee has donated her books to various elementary schools and preschools in Napa Valley, and with Tristan by her side has conducted little seminars with the children at these schools. In addition she has donated a series of her books to the Napa Valley libraries as well as Vallejo library!

Trudee was raised in Ashland, Oregon, and attended the University of Oregon for her undergraduate degree, then attended Western Michigan University for her graduate studies where she specialized in and became a speech and language therapist. She moved around a bit in her early career, finally settling in

Napa and worked in the Vallejo School system for 31 years. During this time she had various animals--horses, dogs, and cats--and has always been an animal lover. When Tristan came into her life, as mentioned earlier, he was very hyper, but she began bringing him to school with her on occasion and saw how helpful he was at calming the children down. This made her think that he might be a good therapy dog, and the rest of the story is history.

They joined PFH and never looked back, and we are so grateful for that. Trudee said she would truly miss some of the patients at the Hospital. Because many of them are chronically ill, the patients are there for a long time and so it was easy to get attached to them.



One patient she and Tristan especially loved was Graham. She told the story that one day Graham acquired a new power wheelchair and when she and Tristan went to visit him, Graham insisted that Trudee put Tristan on his lap so they could take a ride. She did so, and holding onto Tristan's leash, they stood there and visited for a few minutes and then the next thing she

animals, and often causes blindness, deafness, or sometimes both. 
